Written comments may be submitted to the above address from December 8, 2009 through January 8, 2010. The SIP revision addresses requirements on sources to reduce regional haze (visibility impairment) in Theodore Roosevelt National Park (TRNP) and Lostwood Wilderness Area (LWA). The SIP revision includes a Permit to Construct for each of five electric utility steam generating plants which establishes limits for sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxides that are intended to improve visibility impairment in TRNP and LWA.

The National Park Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Federal Land Managers for TRNP and LWA respectively, as well as the U.S. Forest Service have provided comments on the draft Regional Haze SIP revision. The comments and the Department's response to those comments are found in Appendix J.1 of the SIP revision. These documents may be accessed at the website listed above or by contacting the Department.
