Creating an Incubator for Innovation

“Innovation is fostered by information gathered from new connections; from insights gained by journeys into other disciplines or places; from active collegial networks and fluid, open boundaries....Information rich, ambiguous environments are the source of surprising new births.”

As a manager, I find that on many days I have my nose to the grindstone, trying to get critical work accomplished on deadlines with diminishing resources. These are the days when work is, well, work. Other days remind me of my first nonprofit job at the Lincoln, Nebraska YWCA. In creating programming for the Y, I met with many people who had interesting thoughts about what we might offer. To capture all the interesting, and sometimes quirky, ideas that came my way I put a huge sheet of brown paper up in my office. This was work that was creative and fun.

A new executive came to the YWCA shortly after I arrived. She was committed to making the Y a women's center in keeping with the times and she engaged in active outreach to bring in a whole new circle of local women who wanted to be part of an institution-wide shift. In the five years I was there, the organization grew and changed, even as it went through some difficult financial times. We never lost our collective energy to problem solve, incorporate new ideas and programs and build a YWCA that was responsive to the holistic needs and interests of women from varying backgrounds, ages and interests.

One of the things that made that first nonprofit job so interesting, and the YWCA such a dynamic organization, was the constant flow of ideas and information into our small institutional world. All staff were encouraged to bring new ideas to the table and to test the best of them without fear of failure. A host of the ideas from my brown paper were turned into an interesting mix of programming that helped give the Y a new face. The physical education coordinator used her savvy to develop a range of programs that emphasized learning and training over pure use of facilities. We had a paltry weight room, but it was the space where I and many other women learned how to lift weights correctly. We started programs that met the needs of youth and women in crisis. We revisited our financial challenges again and again – how can we save money, how can we raise money – searching for untried solutions. In the five years I was there, we truly saw an organization reborn.

As managers we will always have those “nose to the grindstone” days (hopefully not too many), but we must find a way to keep the door open to fresh ideas, information and exchange. We need to create structures and opportunities that allow people to share ideas, bring new information in from the outside world, and interact across disciplines, departments and other boundaries. That is what will inspire the people we work with and give our efforts the dynamism needed to be able to respond to the challenges of today's world.



LEGISLATIVE CORNER

Major Budget Committee Deadline Approaching

Congressional negotiators are entering a critical week, with the Dec. 15 deadline for any joint budget committee conference report rapidly approaching. At press time there are conflicting reports as to how close members are to reaching a deal and few solid details about how it might address sequestration for FY 2014 and beyond. AMCHP continues working through public health coalitions asking Congress to end sequestration through a balanced approach to deficit reduction. Hopefully, we will have more clarity on what to expect for the remainder of FY 2014 after the Dec. 15 deadline.

Newborn Screening Saves Lives Reauthorization May Address Transport Delays

A U.S. Senate Committee is likely to hold a mark-up this week for a bill to reauthorize the Newborn Screening Saves Lives Act. Details on the bill and a link to the legislative text as introduced are available [here](#). Late last week, AMCHP received indications that additional provisions could be added to the bill to address issues reported in a recent Milwaukee Journal investigative report entitled *Deadly Delays*.

The Journal Sentinel analysis of nearly 3 million newborn screening tests found “that at least 160,000 blood samples from newborns arrived late at labs throughout the country last year.” The journal called this “a conservative calculation, as the newspaper used five or more days as a standard for lateness; federally backed guidelines recommend blood samples take no more than three days to arrive at labs for testing.”

AMCHP is collaborating with the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials, the Association of Public Health Labs and the March of Dimes on this issue. We will share additional details when they are available.

Health Reform Implementation

Healthcare.gov Hits Refresh

On Dec. 1, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) released a [Progress and Performance Report](#) on HealthCare.gov. The report starts with the status of the website in early Oct. and says, “The status of HealthCare.gov in October was marked by an unacceptable user experience” and highlighted what was needed to improve the user experience and functionality of the website. A central command system was implemented with regular meetings to rapidly respond to the ongoing repairs and make necessary decisions. The report states that substantial progress has been made improving the website while there is more work to be done and work will continue. As a reminder, key dates for consumers are:

- Jan. 1, 2014, health coverage can start
 - For those buying health insurance on healthcare.gov (in federally facilitated marketplaces), **in order for coverage to start Jan. 1, 2014 consumers must sign up for insurance by Dec. 23, 2013**
- **Mar. 31, 2014 is the end of open enrollment period until Nov. 15, 2014** for the 2015 enrollment period
- Consumers can apply for the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) and Medicaid **anytime and coverage will start immediately**

AMCHP Partnering with University of North Carolina on New MCH Workforce Development Center

The HRSA Maternal and Child Health Bureau, Division of Workforce Development awarded the University of North Carolina (UNC) Gillings School of Public Health \$5.5 million to start a national MCH Workforce Development Center. The UNC MCH Workforce Center will serve as a consolidated national hub for the program, engaging with key academic, policy and public health practice partners and providing workforce development to state Title V agencies in four core areas related to health reform: access to care, quality improvement, systems integration and population health management. AMCHP Staff Working on Your Behalf

- On Nov. 12-13, AMCHP staff Treeby Brown and Veronica Helms represented AMCHP and helped facilitate select sessions at the *High Expectations: Community Health Workers and Hispanic CSHCN Meeting* in Washington, D.C. Convened by the National Center for Ease of Use of Community Based Services, discussion centered on successful models and strategies utilizing community health workers to increase access to medical homes and reduce disparities for Hispanic CSHCN and their families. Various groups convened at the meeting, including the AAP, MCHB, health plans and state representatives from New York, North Carolina, Rhode Island, Washington, Indiana and the District of Columbia.
- On Nov. 20, AMCHP convened the second work group meeting of the *National Consensus Framework for Improving Quality Systems of Care for CYSHCN* project with support from the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health. More than 40 national and state experts representing Title V programs, Medicaid, CHIP, provider groups, families, health plans and others met in Washington, D.C. to discuss the final draft of comprehensive standards for systems serving children and youth with special health care needs (CYSHCN). The purpose of this project is to reach national consensus on a set of standards that could be used by state Title V programs, Medicaid and CHIP programs, health plans, provider groups, family advocates and others to improve systems of care for this population of children. Discussion centered on the finalization of the standards, endorsement and national consensus and standard implementation at the state and local levels. Work will be conducted throughout this month to incorporate the recommendations of the national work group into the final document for endorsement and national dissemination. - On Nov. 21-22, AMCHP staff Andria Cornell participated in the [Public Health Data Standards Consortium](#) annual business meeting. This meeting brought together federal, state and local health agencies, professional associations, academia, public and private sector organizations, international members and individuals to discuss the changing



health information technology standardization landscape, workforce challenges and strengthening the public health voice in standards development and deployment. AMCHP provided input on the role of standards-based data sharing across sectors in MCH epidemiology and data capacity, and connected with state partners leveraging standards for MCH-related programs and services, including MIECHV and Race to the Top.

- On Dec. 2, AMCHP staff Lacy Fehrenbach participated in the March of Dimes Prematurity Partners Steering Committee meeting in Washington, D.C. The committee reflected on the success of Prematurity Awareness Month and World Prematurity Day in November and discussed opportunities to work together on timely issues including neonatal abstinence syndrome, timeliness of newborn screening and dental care for pregnant women.
- On Dec. 4, AMCHP staff attended a Capitol Hill briefing, *Learning Begins at Birth...Or Even Before!* sponsored by the Congressional Baby Caucus. The chair of the Congressional Baby Caucus, Congresswoman Rosa DeLauro provided introductions and support for this important work while former Sen. Chris Dodd, Ross Thompson, Ph.D. from University of California, Davis, and Tammy Mann, Ph.D. Campagna Center in Alexandria, VA presented on the importance of early childhood programs and systems to support our nation's children in reaching their full potential. The briefing also provided background on the *Strong Start for America's Children Act of 2013* ([H.R. 3461](#) and [S. 1697](#)) and its components: access to prekindergarten, early learning quality partnerships and child care.


