Governing Body

33-03-24.1-09.



- 
- For the quality of resident services.
 - For resident health, safety, and security.
 - To ensure the overall operation of the facility is in compliance with all applicable federal, state, and local laws.





- Infection control practices.
- Provide a sanitary environment.





- An active program for the prevention, investigation, management, and control of infections and communicable diseases in residents and staff members.

Resident rights

- Comply with North Dakota Century Code Chapter 50-10.2.



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- Residents are to receive information about their rights upon admission and annually.



CLIA



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- To obtain and maintain compliance with the clinical laboratory improvement amendments of 1988, if the facility provides any clinical laboratory testing services.





Facilities performing lab testing must have a CLIA certificate such as a Certificate of Waiver

- Blood glucose with meters
- Urine dips
- Occult blood





Fire Safety

33-03-24.1-10.



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- Comply with the national fire protection association life safety code, 1988 edition, chapter twenty-one, residential board and care occupancy, slow evacuation capability, or a greater level of fire safety.





Resident assessments and care plans

33-03-24.1-12.





- A review of health, psychosocial, functional, nutritional, and activity status.
- Personal care and other needs.
- Health needs.
- The capability of self-preservation
- Specific social and activity needs.





The care plan must be based on the assessment and updated as needed, but no less than quarterly.




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- Medical conditions
 - Medication
 - Skin breakdown
 - Dressing/ Wound care
 - Weight loss



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- Behaviors
 - ADL assistance
 - Diet changes
 - Unsteady gait/falls risk
 - Incontinence/Bowel problems

Social Services

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- To identify the social service needs of the resident.
 - To ensure the needs of the residents are met.
 - To provide social service directly by facility staff.
 - To have referral agencies available.





Nursing Services

33-03-24.1-17.





Available to meet the needs of the residents

- Either by the facility directly.
- Or arranged by the facility through an appropriate individual or agency.





Dietary Services

33-03-24.1-18.



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- Must meet the dietary needs of the residents and provide dietary services in conformance with the North Dakota sanitary requirements for food establishments.

General building requirements.

- Must operate in conformance with all state and local laws, rules, and ordinances concerning fire safety and sanitation.



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- Comply with other building requirements for government entities on a state or local level.
