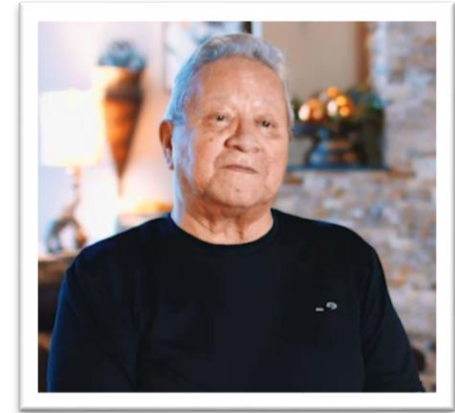

She now encourages everyone to get screened on time and know their family history: “It may be tough or seem embarrassing to talk to your family about colorectal cancer screening, but encouraging a loved one to get screened could save their life! If you could prevent cancer, would you? A colonoscopy can prevent cancer!”

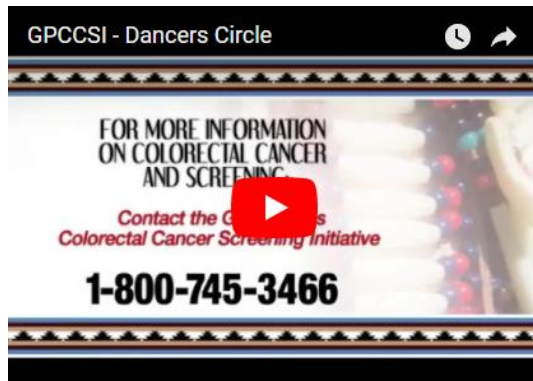

Colorectal cancer is the 2nd most common cancer among American Indians. When detected early, it can have a 90% survival rate. If you're 50 or older, or have a family history of colon cancer, talk to your doctor about getting screened.

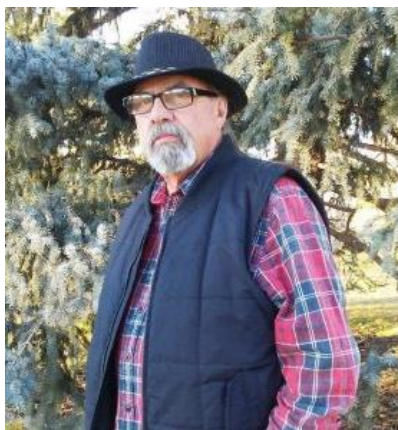
