- Narrow Definitions of Masculinity was identified in several communities Visit
 <u>Exercises and Activities that Support Primary Prevention</u> for ways to explore this
 social norm.

• Community Readiness Program Updates –

- The group used a table and their readiness level scores to frame program updates.
- Mallory shared an example of Level 2 Activity Engage **other local related** educational/health outreach groups to assist in promoting awareness of social norms.
 - Domestic Violence Abuse Center Inc (Grafton) participated in Wear Purple Day on October 18. They shared pictures on their Facebook page from fourteen local agencies who submitted photos of themselves or their staff wearing purple.
 Agencies were entered into a drawing to win donuts the next day. One agency

even went above and beyond by making purple shirts with their business name and a "Stop Domestic Violence" patch on the sleeve specifically for Wear Purple Day.

Social Norms Pie

Purpose:

To help communities or groups move to primary prevention action; action to provide a counter message to the Social Norms that is supportive of gender violence. In order to work effectively and collaboratively on prevention, groups need consensus about which norm(s) to focus attention to. This activity will help a group have a shared understanding about the prevalence and impact of these Social Norms while building consensus in what direction to move forward.

Time: 30 mins

<u>Materials</u>: full size white sheet for each person, sheet of newsprint for each small group; colored markers

<u>Introduction:</u> Let's watch this 8 minute presentation together: http://www.preventconnect.org/wp-content/uploads/files/presentations/Norms Change/index.html

Facilitator – Talk about the added norm of sexualization of children. Put up a slide or have a handout with all 6 Social Norms.





Ask the group:

- 1. What stands out to you about these norms?
- 2. How do you see them playing out in our communities?

Give each person a sheet of paper and a marker and have them create a pie chart illustrating which norms the group feels are the most significant. The larger the pie slice equals the greater impact the norm has. Ask the small groups to also identify with a star which norm they would suggest starting to work on shifting and why.

When everyone has their pie chart, ask them to get into small groups to discuss and come up with a combined pie chart to share with the group.

Each small group then presents their pie and reasoning, including sharing which norms they would like to start countering and why. Then ask:

- 3. What themes are we noticing?
- 4. What insights about the 6 social norms are emerging?
- 5. Which one makes the most sense for us to make a priority at this time?
