
# SHARED RISK AND PROTECTIVE FACTORS

Opportunities for collaboration



Different forms of violence occur across the lifespan.

This graphic shows the time in a lifespan when these different forms of violence most commonly occur. Since there is an overlap among these different forms of violence, one person may experience mutiple forms of violence in their lifetime or even at the same time.


There are shared risk and protective factors that make people more or less likely to experience one or more of these types of violence during their lifetime. Also, involvement in one type of violence can, in of itself, be a risk factor for another form of violence.
