





Phases of Emergency Management



All-Hazards Approach

- ICS origins in Fire
- Need at Wildland Fires
- September 11 attacks
- Fundamentals of the job are the same regardless of incident type





ND Disaster Events

Amtrak Derailment - 160 pts
     Tour Bus Accident - 56 pts
     Chemical Exposure - 43 pts
Anhydrous Ammonia Leak - >100 pts
    School Bus Accident - 34 pts
      37 Car Accident - 52 pts
   Hospital Evacuation - >350 pts
```

Why use ICS?

- Greater efficiency
- Better use of time / Coordination
- More effective communications
- Saves \$\$\$
- Regulatory requirement

ICS Flexibility

- Allows for expansion or contraction
- Only fill positions needed to achieve incident objectives
- Each section must have a person in charge
- An effective span of control must be maintained

ICS Application

- Keep it simple!
- Conduct an HVA
- Provide Training
- Exercise for Gaps

 Regardless of the size of incident, it will require the same types of resources but at different levels








Five Main Management Functions




Who can instruct?
