Sarah Weninger is the Adult Viral Hepatitis Prevention Coordinator with the North Dakota Department of Health, Division of Disease Control. Sarah has been working in the Division for almost four years. She has a BS in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology from North Dakota State University and is currently enrolled at Des Moines University in Iowa completing her Master's of Public Health. In addition to working in Viral Hepatitis, she is the lead foodborne outbreak investigator for the Division of Disease Control.
