

June 27, 2016 - Engaging Men in Sexual Violence Prevention through the Lens of Gender Roles Webinar

INTRODUCTION

The toolkit was developed as part of Goal 3 of the North Dakota Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Prevention Plan to increase the use of evidence-based primary prevention strategies in communities around North Dakota. The toolkit contains resources for the prevention or elimination of sexual and intimate partner violence that any agency, school, or organization can use in their work. The Rape Prevention and Education Grant sends monthly email updates related to the toolkit and hosts webinars related to toolkit content and sexual violence prevention work in ND.

Engaging Men Webinar

A webinar geared toward anyone interested in engaging men in sexual violence prevention was held on June 27, 2016 and attended by 28. The webinar announcement were marketed to a wide audience including substance abuse prevention partners, local public health units, campus partners, schools, school nurses, youth prevention organizations, extension offices, suicide coalitions, tribal partners, family planning programs, catholic health initiative violence prevention program, human trafficking partners as well as a variety of other contacts that have been involved with injury prevention.

Prevention and Education Staff from Rape and Abuse Crisis Center in Fargo, ND presented on their journey to engage men in preventing sexual violence and intimate partner violence. It included the challenges and successes Rape and Abuse Crisis Center experienced.

- Banning jeggings in high schools
- No leggings policy in school
- Multiple arrest for child pornography
- State legislator arrested for DV
- UND study that collegiate males said they would force a woman to have sexual intercourse, but not consider that rape
- Fargo's Everyone's Business campaign had continued discussion beyond the formal video airing

What is inspiring about RACC's journey?

- Seeing the process
- Collaboration and tenacity involved
- Didn't give up when times got hard
- Ability to maintain efforts over time
- Total number of people and the buy in
- Evolution of the buy in from community members
- Men engaging
- Data driven decision making and trusting your community to inform decisions
